


CHAPLAINCY WALL

We are excited to share with you our new chaplaincy wall art, a beautifully crafted piece that encapsulates the rich heritage and values of our school community. Inspired by ideas from our chaplaincy team and Fr. Greg last year, this artwork features a vine symbolising Jesus, which elegantly weaves together different elements of our school ethos.









On one side of the mural, the art pays tribute to Don Bosco's legacy in Turin. It highlights significant sites such as the Valdocco Oratory, the first youth centre he established for poor and abandoned boys; the Basilica of Mary Help of Christians, built in 1868 as the spiritual heart of the Salesians; and Colle Don Bosco, a complex that includes a shrine, museum, and retreat centre.





On the other side, the artwork reflects our school's location in Battersea, London, where Don Bosco's mission continues to inspire us today. Look closely and you'll notice familiar local landmarks, including Battersea Power Station, The London Eye, London Bridge, and The Shard, all of which connect our community to the vibrant life of our city. At the very centre of the piece, the focus shifts to Rome, the global centre of the Catholic Church and home to the Vatican. Don Bosco's strong ties to Rome are beautifully represented here. He visited Rome on several occasions to meet with the Pope and discuss his educational mission, and this part of the mural also features the Basilica of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, built under his supervision near Rome's Termini Station. This segment serves as a reminder of the enduring influence of his work and the central role of Rome in the life of the Catholic community.



We are proud to display this wall art as a visual celebration of our school's heritage, faith, and commitment to nurturing a caring and inspired community. We hope that it resonates with you as much as it does with us and serves as a meaningful reminder of the values we share.

HOLY YEAR

If you have recently been into the school, you may have noticed new green door arches on our internal reception and playground doors. These additions are not just decorative; they serve as a meaningful reminder

that 2025 is a Holy Year.

DON BOSCO ASHALAYAM PROJECT IN KOLKATA



One of the great things about being part of SJBC is being part of the Salesian family of schools and centres across the whole globe.

Over the half-term, Fr. Andrew visited the Don Bosco Ashalayam project in Kolkata, India, strengthening the bond between our school and this lifechanging initiative. During his visit, he helped deliver the fundraising money we've raised and witnessed firsthand the impact of our support.

As part of our commitment, students at SJBC wrote letters to the children at Ashalayam. We are eagerly awaiting their replies and look forward to learning more about their lives and experiences.

For over 25 years, Don Bosco Ashalayam has been a Home of Hope, rescuing vulnerable and



abandoned children from the streets of Kolkata. The Salesians provide shelter, clothing, food, medical care, and education - acting as a family for those in need. Their priority is always to reunite children with their families where possible. When this isn't an option, they support them through schooling, vocational training, or further education, ensuring they have a future filled with hope and opportunity.



Ashalayam also runs a drop-in centre for street children, offering food, basic education, and a safe space to rest - crucial protection against the dangers of trafficking and abuse. The project receives no government funding and relies solely on charitable donations, including those from our school.





SJBC has been proud to have been supporting Don Bosco Ashalayam for several years, and we remain committed to making a difference in the lives of these children. Thank you to everyone who contributed to our fundraising efforts - you are truly helping to change lives. Our ABBA afternoon last term was a huge success, raising an incredible £2,221 for street children projects in Kolkata, India, and Mexico City.
