INSPIRING FUTURES: BLACK IN SPORT FOUNDER VISITS BOSCO



This week, our students were treated to an inspiring Bosco Discovery Talk from Ladi Ogunmekan, founder of Black In Sport, an organisation dedicated to celebrating Black achievement in sport and creating pathways for young people into a wide range of careers beyond the pitch.

Ladi founded Black In Sport in response to the racist backlash following the EURO 2020 Final. The organisation aims to change the narrative by amplifying diverse voices, providing access to professional networks, and offering opportunities for young people to thrive in the sports industry and beyond.

During the talk, Ladi shared powerful reflections on his own journey, the importance of representation, and how his faith has guided him in making good decisions throughout his life and career.







Our Sixth Form students asked thought-provoking questions about a range of topics, including how to choose a career path, what it was like to study during the Covid era, and how Ladi managed to launch his own business while still at university.

It was a truly engaging and uplifting event, one that left a lasting impact on our students and sparked valuable conversations about ambition, resilience, and future aspirations.


CREATIVITY AND COMMUNITY AT THE HEART OF ART AT SJBC

It's been a busy and exciting week in the Art Department at SJBC, with students across different year groups getting hands-on with creativity and learning about the world beyond the classroom.

Our Year 10 Art students have been working on imaginative project creating masks inspired ceramic by As their nature. part of learning, they explored artists who work in both mask design ceramics. before and developing their own ideas and final piece plans.











Students practised working with clay, learning how to create textures using a range of tools, and how to use the scratch and score method to attach different parts.

They sculpted their masks over a newspaper base, with the final steps of painting and varnishing now underway.

The students are rightly proud of their work—there's always a great sense of achievement when a plan begins to take shape in 3D form.

Meanwhile, our Year 9 students took part in an engaging Town Planning workshop delivered by members of Wandsworth Council. The session introduced students to the key considerations in designing public spaces, including land value, demand, climate change and community needs. Students were set the challenge of reimagining the Clapham Junction area, working to a budget of £10,000 to create an improved environment for local people.



Their ideas ranged from increasing green spaces and tree planting, to better lighting for safety at night, and more bins to tackle litter. One group even proposed a new public park—'Junction Park' while others designed a new underground rail link to Battersea Power Station!

Students also learned about the variety of careers connected to planning, including urban design, infrastructure planning, and conservation work. The team from Wandsworth Council were hugely impressed with the students' creativity, collaboration and thoughtful ideas.











Well done to all students involved you represented the school brilliantly.

SCIENCE WEEK AT SJBC - CELEBRATING CURIOSITY AND DISCOVERY



Throughout the month, students will take part in a range of activities celebrating STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths), encouraging them to think creatively and engage with the world around them.

This week marked the start of Science Week at SJBC, a fantastic opportunity for students to explore the theme of change and adaptation across the natural world and beyond. In assemblies, students reflected on how science links with our values of curiosity, critical thinking and resilience, and how these are gifts to be nurtured.







We're also inviting students to take part in our exciting **Science Video Challenge** a chance to film a safe, fun science experiment at home and bring learning to life in a creative way.

Videos should be submitted to science teachers by **Tuesday 25th March**, with the best entries shared with the whole school for voting!

This competition was a great way to highlight the importance of representation in science - and to inspire the next generation of young scientists right here at SJBC!

STUDENT VOICE: PRAYER AND WORSHIP AT OUR SCHOOL

As part of our ongoing commitment to nurturing the spiritual and moral development of all students, we recently invited our young people to share their thoughts on the impact of prayer and worship at school. Their feedback helps us reflect on what we're doing well and how we can continue to grow as a community of faith.



HOW OFTEN DO STUDENTS HAVE TIME TO REFLECT AND PRAY?

We're pleased to share that the majority of students say they have the opportunity to pause and pray daily. These regular moments of quiet reflection play an important role in students' wellbeing and spiritual formation.

WHAT DO STUDENTS VALUE MOST ABOUT PRAYER AT SCHOOL?

Many students described prayer time as a peaceful and meaningful part of the school day. They especially appreciated:

- Praying for others and the wider world
- The sense of calm and quiet during moments of reflection
- Familiar prayers like the 'Our Father'
- Opportunities to connect with faith and values
- Clear guidance from staff to help them understand the purpose of prayer



WHAT DID STUDENTS SAY ABOUT THE OVERALL EXPERIENCE?

Students rated the prayer and worship experience 4.1 out of 5 on average, with many giving it top marks. This highlights the positive impact it is having across the school community.



WHAT COULD WE DO EVEN BETTER?

As always, our students offered thoughtful ideas for improvement, including:

- Making sure all students can hear clearly by improving speaker systems
- Involving students more in leading prayer, helping it feel more personal and relevant
- Continuing to guide students on how to reflect more meaningfully
- Ensuring prayer topics are even more diverse and inclusive





- Moving Forward Together






